📜 Alumni Spotlight 🦙 Dr. Alex Turner, DVM



Karen Kronauge had the pleasure of catching up with Alex Turner, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, in between his mobile vet calls.

Thank you so much for sitting down with us, Alex. When did you graduate from Westernaires?

Alex: I graduated from Red Team and Cavalry at Stock Show 1995.

Karen: Do you have a favorite show or memory of your time spent in

Westernaires?

Alex: I would definitely have to say that my favorite Westernaire show,

> hands down, was the trip that Cavalry took up to Glacier National Park in Montana. We were asked to go up there and perform a Cavalry and Indian battle with actual members of the Blackfoot tribe. It was very cool. While we were there, we stayed on the Blackfoot res-

ervation and it was absolutely beautiful.

The show was arranged by Monty Montana, Jr., and we were performing for a bunch of high school students and celebrities. We got to hear Norman Schwarzkopf speak, and we got to hear Johnny Cash sing the National Anthem. That was an experience that I will never forget. For some reason, only men went on this trip. There were no monitors or costume moms or any other women that went along, for some reason. It was male bonding to the extreme. This was also the

only trip that my dad ever went on with us, and that meant a lot to me.

Karen: Tell us about your life now. How do you spend your time, and what do you do for fun?

Alex: I'm a father and a husband, so I tend to stay pretty busy. I work as an equine vet in Jefferson County,

Colorado. When I'm not working, I like to spend time in the mountains, ski, mountain bike, and play

volleyball.

Karen: Do you own any horses right now, Alex?

Alex: I don't have any horses any more, but my 3-year-old daughter keeps telling me that we're going to own

a paint horse someday soon. So I think I'd better start looking for a half-way sane paint horse!

Karen: How did Westernaires influence your decision to become a veterinarian?

Alex: It was a little more indirect than you might think. I always knew that I wanted to be a vet. My first grade

teacher was Alice Johnson. She knew about my aspirations, and she is the person who told me about Westernaires. I draw upon my experiences as a Westernaire every day at work. Westernaires taught me so much about horses and horse behavior. I felt like I really had a leg up during my studies at CSU. (Editor's note: Alice Johnson, or "A.J.", was a long-time Westernaire volunteer and is the mother

of alumna Kim (Johnson) Ellis).

Did you have any mentors or role models while in Westernaires? Karen:

Alex: I remember that Mike Skelton, our Cavalry instructor, was such a disciplinarian, but he was always fair.

He did a good job of instilling on me the manners that I still use to this day. Some of the other Posse,

dads, and volunteers — like Barry Wolf, Ron Kronauge, and Art Geis — really made an impact on me.

Do you ever do any vet work on the Westernaire rental horses? Karen:

No, but I'd be happy to, anytime! I believe they're currently being well taken care of by the professionals Alex:

at Golden Animal Hospital. However, I do see a lot of horses owned by current Westernaire riders though. I also really enjoy helping some of the newer Westernaires to find the right horse that would be

a good fit for Westernaires.

Karen: Do you keep in contact with any of the other Westernaires with whom you rode?

Alex: Yes, I'm still very good friends with about a dozen

or so of the people that I rode with. I also run into other alumni on a regular basis through the course

of my job. All different generations of them.

Karen: Okay, let's give your vet service a plug. How can



The "Annual LRC Show", as it was called then, was first held outdoors at the Mississippi Stables (at Mississippi and Wadsworth Avenue). In 1954, Annual Show moved indoors to the very confined quarters of the Livestock Arena at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds, and it then shifted to National Western's Stockyard Stadium in 1955. In 1994, after nearly 40 years of performances in the Stockyard Stadium, Annual Show migrated next door to the newly-built Event Center arena, where it currently is performed each year.

Bringing a Horse to Annual Show?

Are you an alumnus who would like to bring your own horse to Annual Show? Upon your arrival on November 6th, please stop in at the Barn Office (it's on the northeast side of warm-up arena) and check in with Barn Superintendent Larry Britton.

Larry will provide you will a stall and a stall card. The stall fee is \$10.00 for the entire weekend. Please bring your own feed and any necessary supplements and tack that you may require.

Anyone who rents a stall will be expected to fully clean the stall upon departure on November 7th, after the show.

Adult Ride Classes Begin Soon

Do you live in the Denver area? Would you like to get back onto a saddle again? Every year, Westernaires provides riding lessons to adults (age 18 and over). Participants need not be Westernaire alumni; any adults are welcome, so feel free to bring your spouses and friends. Lessons occur each Wednesday evening in the Red Arena at Fort Westernaire.

"Adult Ride" will begin with an orientation meeting, at which time the instructors discuss course curriculum and teach students to groom and saddle their horses.

Fees are \$10 per week for horse rental, or \$3 if you provide your own horse.

Historic Pictures - Annual Show 1956

It is a year-around program now requiring the serices of 11 riding and speciality instructors and 10 junior intructors. Each year a new class is taken in and the entrance ages are 9 through 14 years. The exit age is 18 years or high school graduation, whichever is later.


From the Senior Westernaires are chosen the nationally known 30-horse precision drill team, the nounted archery act, the gay nineties sidesaddle review, rope turilers, vocallettes, grand entry team, liberty act, creatry company, etc.

The 30-horse precision drill team has been an outstanding attraction at many shows in our area including the National Western, Oreeley, Estee Park, Soulder Fow Wow, and the Fikes Peak or Bust Rodeo. They have been invited to appear in many other shows outside our area but to date have been unable to accept these invitations.

These young riders are given a complete course in horsemanship with an emphasis on the teaching of cleanliness, sportsamship and love and care of the horses. They have lectured before large groups on this interesting subject and have appeared on many radio and television programs

The total organization now has an enrollment of 220 young folks and is almost entirely self-supporting through this, its annual show.

- The Westernaires are bringing a very successful Summer show season to a close. Red Team performed shows in Washington, Kansas; Grand County, Colorado; and made numerous appearances in the metro-Denver area. Cavalry and Indian Warriors performed numerous shows, including one in Byers, Colorado. Precisionettes performed in Fort Collins, Colorado; Sedalia, Colorado, and in Highlands Ranch, Colorado. Royal Rangers and Crimson Rangers made fans cheer at several shows around Jefferson County this Summer.
- A notably large class, 315 new Tenderfeet were inducted into Westernaires on August 27th, 2010.
- Solution Continuing the legacy: there are at least three newlyinducted Tenderfeet this year who are children of Westernaire alumni.
